

United Way Announces 2023-2026 Community Impact Grantees *Making a difference in the lives of half a million people in the region*

PITTSBURGH, PA (June 22, 2023) – United Way is pleased to award 150 Impact Fund grants serving more than 500,000 people in the region. Each year, for a total of three years, nearly \$7.5 million will be distributed to 110 organizations, 53 of which are new grant recipients.

"It is an honor to award the Community Impact grants knowing the significant work that will be set in motion," said Bobbi Watt Geer, President and CEO of United Way of Southwestern Pennsylvania. "We're very fortunate to have the incredible support of our donors — individuals, corporations and foundations — who enable us to provide our partners with the resources they need to create true change in their communities. Not only will we see the implementation of so many important and impactful programs, but our mission to mobilize the caring power of our community to improve lives will be carried out to half a million people across the five-county region."

Through this significant investment in the community, grantee programs will focus on supporting people in United Way's investment priority areas: meeting basic needs, moving toward financial stability and building for success in school and life.

In 2021, United Way of Southwestern Pennsylvania adopted a new strategic framework to focus its impact, drive community investment and engage more people in its mission. In line with that framework, United Way refined its grant making process to identify and support the most impactful human service agencies through a highly competitive, strategy-focused Request for Proposal (RFP) process. In November 2022, United Way of Southwestern Pennsylvania invited human service organizations across its five-county region – Allegheny, Armstrong, Butler, Fayette and Westmoreland – to apply for and receive funding through the new RFP.

United Way utilized real-time data from PA 211 Southwest as well as its relationship with community partners and stakeholders to identify community challenges and select proposals that meet those challenges through innovative, solution-based strategies. The strategies that will be invested in as a result of the 2023-2026 Impact Fund grants are as follows:

Strategy: Working collaboratively with school districts and other community partners that provide positive **out-of-school time** opportunities for young people.
